Phil and Jill's youngest son is a very clever but insecure child, who demands a lot of attention and support from adults in front of other children, and who doesn't like changes. His parents want to find a school where he can have a fair amount of teacher attention and go through primary and secondary education without moving schools, whether he chooses to go to university or to train for a job.



Geena and Ted's son is finishing his fourth school year and has just been found to have an extremely high IQ. They've been advised to take him to a school where he can fully develop his potential without feeling too different or special.

John's parents sent him to a school where a lot of emphasis was put on results, and that pressure deprived him of much childhood enjoyment. He certainly doesn't want his daughter Hanna, a very smart, happy girl, to have a similar experience. He's looking for a school where Hanna can learn all the academic stuff as well as develop all kinds of abilities, and where he can keep a close eye on his daughter's progress.

Ann and Sam's daughter is about to start school. They believe that the first years at school are fundamental in a child's education. They are also persuaded that parent involvement is a key factor in successful schooling. Their child is a very bright girl (they think she might be extremely gifted), but they are mainly interested in her well being and they want her to have a balanced education, with good academic work but also with opportunities to develop other abilities and to have a normal childhood and enjoy other aspects of life.
